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Mandate and Role

- IPC provides independent review of government decisions, practices concerning access and privacy
- Brian Beamish appointed for 5 year term last month
- renewed focus on:
 - helping institutions address privacy/access concerns
 - Ontario-based issues
 - efficient/effective tribunal



Oversee Three Acts

- Freedom of Information and Protection of Privacy Acts (FIPPA/MFIPPA)
 - right of access to government records; appeal to IPC, binding orders
 - privacy rules for government; complaints to IPC investigations may lead to recommendations or orders
- Personal Health Information Protection Act (PHIPA)
 - o privacy rules for PHI; right of access to that information
 - complaints to IPC reviews may lead to orders

IPC Structure


- Tribunal
 - o mediation, investigation, adjudication
 - led by Assistant Commissioner Sherry Liang
- Policy, Health Policy, Legal, Communications,
 Administration
 - research, advice, comment on proposed programs, legislation that impact access/privacy
 - represent IPC in court
 - o led by Assistant Commissioner David Goodis

What the Tribunal has been doing

- Recent orders and court decisions of interest:
 - Order PO-3461 (public interest override; DNA samples)
 - Christopher's Law decision (SCC) and subsequent
 Order PO-3429 (postal codes)
 - Family Responsibility Office (ON CA)

What the Tribunal has been doing

- Ministry of Finance [Order PO-3365]
 - Records of expert panel advising the government on reform to auto insurance covered by FIPPA

- Thunder Bay District Catholic School Board [Order MO-3141] and others
 - Records of school board transportation consortiums within custody or control of constituent boards


What the Tribunal has been doing

Privacy investigations

- City of Vaughan [Privacy Report MC13-67]
 - online posting of PI in minor variance applications under Planning Act
- Guelph Police Services Board [Privacy Report MC13-49]
 - Use of Youth Criminal Justice Act information for purpose of police reference check not permitted

What the Tribunal has been doing Health privacy and access

- London Health Sciences Centre [PHIPA Order HO-014]
 - fees for "access" and "disclosure" are the same
 - based on reasonable cost recovery
- Rouge Valley Health System [PHIPA Order HO-013]
 - hospital staff snooping into "new baby" records for purpose of marketing RESPs
 - hospital's privacy policies, training deficient



Policy/Legal: Law enforcement

- Police record checks; continuing privacy concern
 - checks now routine for many jobs, volunteer positions
 - growing concern that employers obtain irrelevant information, particularly non-conviction info
- IPC calls for legislative reform, consistency
 - IPC worked with OACP, MCSCS to develop solution
 - province now says it is considering legislation

Policy/Legal: Law enforcement

- Crossing the Line investigation report [2014]:
 - Toronto woman denied entry to US at Pearson Airport due to mental health concern
 - 2012 suicide attempt on CPIC due to 911 call
 - US border officials have direct, instant CPIC access
- IPC finds police uploading info about suicide attempt/threat is improper disclosure [FIPPA, s. 42]
 - disclosure permissible only where valid public safety concern



Policy/Legal: Law enforcement

- Crossing the Line investigation report [2014]
 - most police services comply
 - but Toronto Police refuse
 - IPC brings application for judicial review, asks
 Divisional Court to order compliance
 - hearing expected in fall 2015

Law enforcement

- body worn cameras
 - working with Toronto Police on pilot project
 - important accountability tool, but privacy must be respected
 - F/P/T Commissioners' guidelines (Feb 17)
 - mission creep concern: combine with facial recognition technology?

Privacy Impact Assessments

- critical component of project management
 - helps to ensure regulatory compliance
 - MGCS guidelines work well for larger institutions such as ministries; OPS focused
- IPC will soon issue user-friendly PIA guidelines for M/FIPPA institutions
 - e.g., smaller municipalities, police, school boards
 - adaptable to broad range of programs, information systems (private sector also)

Best Practices for Protecting Individual Privacy in Conducting Survey Research

- updated from 1999 version, co-authored with OPS
- changes reflect use of online survey tools, use of mobile devices



Guidelines for Posting PI

- stemming from Vaughan privacy report re: disclosing Pl under *Planning Act*
 - IPC will shortly release guidelines for municipalities for online posting of personal information
 - advice will include measures to reduce likelihood of PI being revealed by search engines

Privacy Class Actions

- *Hopkins v. Kay*, 2015 ONCA 112
 - Ontario Court of Appeal affirms patients' right to sue hospitals for invasion of privacy tort (Jones v. Tsige)
 - court says limiting right to cases where IPC issues
 PHIPA order too restrictive
 - IPC intervenes, argues in favour of common law right, since IPC will exercise discretion not to conduct review/issue order, for wide variety of reasons (SCC leave application)

Time Extensions: Federal Court Intervention

- Canada (Information Commissioner) v. Canada (National Defence), 2015 FCA 26
 - National Defence extends 30-day time limit to respond to request under federal ATIA by 1,110 days
 - Information Commissioner asks court to find ND in "deemed refusal"
 - FC rules government time extension not reviewable
 - on appeal, FCA reverses: time extensions require independent review by Commissioner, court; IPC intervened to assist court

Open Government

- Open by Default report [Open Government Engagement Team, 2014]
 - province has more work to do to create culture of openness
 - recommended updates to FIPPA/MFIPPA, "one stop" open government platform/app, fees reform
- IPC will issue guidelines to help institutions advance open government agenda
 - focus on small steps -- can be a daunting task
 - will engage with individual institutions to identify their needs, give advice on how to move forward
